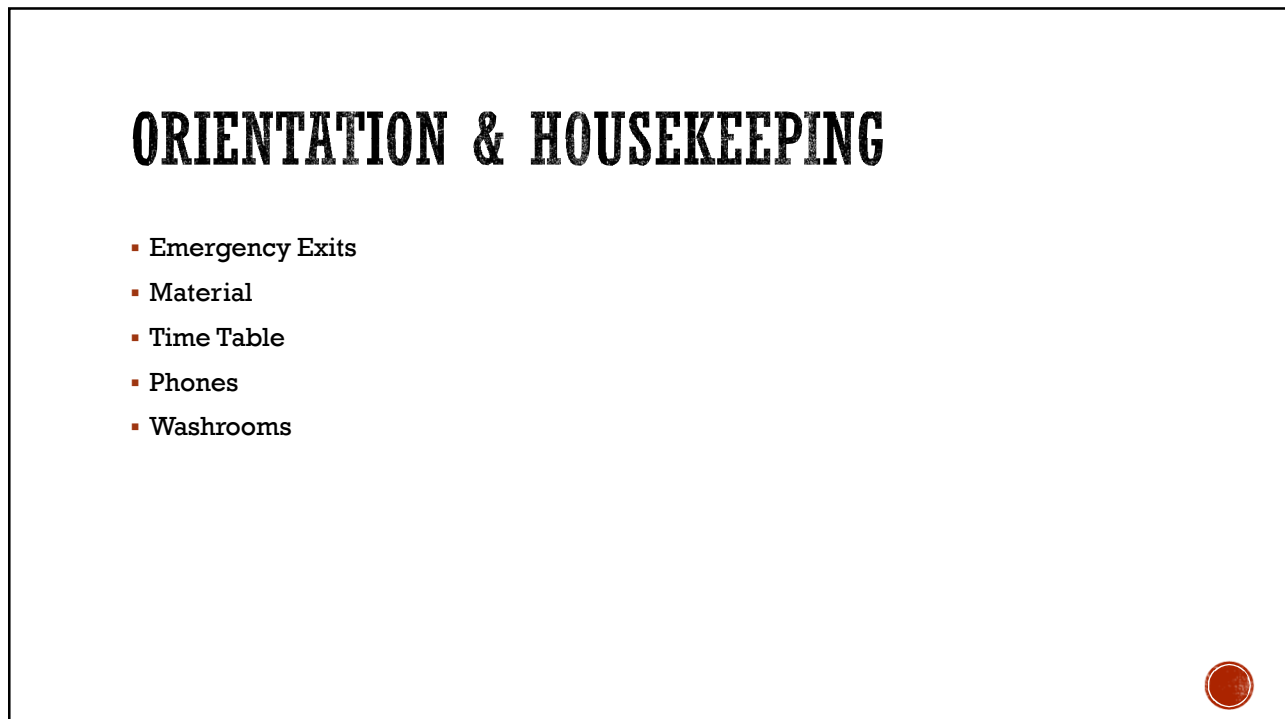

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION WHY A RANGE SAFETY COURSE?

- The Taber Shooting Foundation has established as a policy the requirement for a Range Safety Officer (RSO) to be present at any shooting range before firearms may be discharged.
- Becoming an RSO is not required, however without an RSO designation you will not be provided a KEY FOB to the facility and will not be able to discharge a firearm without an RSO being present.

THE VITAL FOUR ACTS OF FIREARM SAFETY

 **A**SSUME EVERY FIREARM IS LOADED

 **C**ONTROL THE MUZZLE DIRECTIONS AT ALL TIMES

 **T**RIGGER FINGER MUST BE KEPT OFF THE TRIGGER AND OUT OF THE TRIGGER GUARD

 **S**EE THAT THE FIREARM IS UNLOADED – PROVE IT SAFE

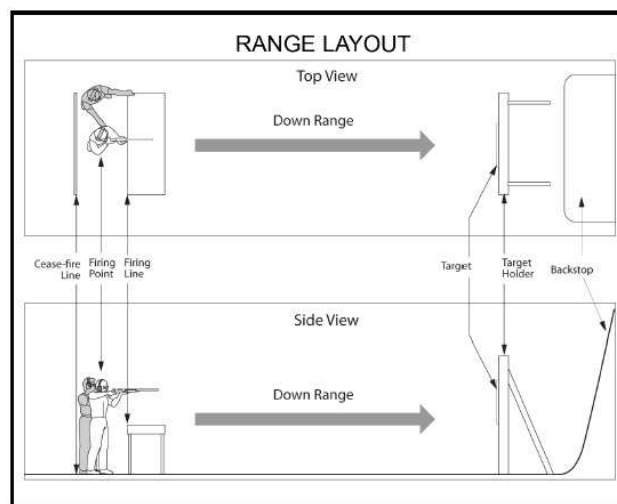

RANGE TERMS:

- CEASE FIRE LINE
- FIRING POINT
- FIRING LINE
- TARGET
- TARGET HOLDER
- BACKSTOP

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

RANGE COMMANDS:

- SHOOTERS TO THE LINE
- THE RANGE IS NOW ACTIVE (OPEN)
- CEASE FIRE
- UNLOAD AND PREPARE FOR INSPECTION
- THE FIRING LINE IS NO LONGER ACTIVE

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

UNACCEPTABLE TARGETS:

- Any target which, when fired upon, will damage or litter private or public property. This includes signs, wire insulators, bottles, old buildings, parked equipment and abandoned cars
- Illegal game. This includes out of season or endangered species
- Any target, material or shape that can cause ricochets

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

UNACCEPTABLE TARGETS:

- Any target which, when fired upon, might endanger the safety of others. Special attention is required when shooting near inhabited areas, across or along roads, over hills and at water or hard surfaces
- Any target which, when fired upon, may disturb others. Eg. Discharging firearms early in the morning or near dwellings
- Any target made of glass or other material which causes fragment hazards

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

HAZARDS & PRECAUTIONS

ACCESS BY UNQUALIFIED OR UNAUTHORIZED USERS

- Disable action before storage or transport (or use trigger or cable lock)
- Store firearms in a safely locked cabinet or container, out of view
- Store ammunition separately and out of view
- Supervise unqualified users

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

HAZARDS & PRECAUTIONS

ACCIDENTAL DISCHARGE

- Control muzzle direction at all times
- Unload firearm when not in immediate use
- Open action when handling
- Keep finger off trigger and out of the trigger guard except when firing
- Safety ON
- No horseplay
- A malfunctioning firearm may result in unintentional discharge
- Ensure your firearm is well maintained and regularly serviced

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

HAZARDS & PRECAUTIONS

WRONG AMMUNITION

- Carry only correct ammunition
- Check ammunition against firearm data stamp
- Use proper ammunition for target and conditions
- If re-loading, follow correct procedures
- Improperly loaded ammunition can cause a firearm incident
- Ensure you know how to load correctly

HAZARDS & PRECAUTIONS

RICOCHETS

- Be extra cautious when shooting at or towards flat or hard surfaces
- Check area near or behind target before firing
- Be extra cautious when shooting at or towards water

HAZARDS & PRECAUTIONS

WRONG TARGET

- Identify target before firing and be sure, before you shoot
- Know what is behind the target
- Make sure the backstop is adequate

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Store all firearms and ammunition properly.** Keep your firearms and ammunition properly secured and out of sight.

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Explain firearms safety to all family members.** Everyone in a home where firearms are kept should know the safety rules. Firearms are no different than dangerous tools or poisons in the home. Proper use and handling of firearms and ammunition must be taught to the entire family. The key or combination number to secure locking devices should be kept away from and out of the reach of children and unauthorized adults.

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Remove firearms from situations of potential violence.** You may become aware of a situation where violence or tragedy could occur. In such cases, it is wise to go beyond the safe storage of firearms. Completely remove firearms that may be present. If this is not possible, at least notify the police of the situation.

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Act sensibly and carefully while around firearms.** Always pay close attention to what you and others around you are doing. Make sure that everyone is acting safely and responsibly.

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Never consume drugs or alcoholic beverages when around firearms.** Do not go shooting with anyone who has. Alcohol and drugs can affect your mental or physical reactions. Both prescription and non-prescription drugs can affect your alertness, senses and balance. Some types of allergy medicines are a good example. Always stay fully alert when around firearms.

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Always get permission before shooting on someone else's property.** Make sure that you are welcome and permitted before you shoot anywhere. Do this whether the land belongs to the crown, to a local club, or to a private citizen. Make sure that you can shoot there safely. For example, someone else may be shooting there at the same time. Check with local authorities.

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Have your eyesight checked regularly.** Shooting requires good vision for target identification and accuracy. Be sure of your target and beyond.

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Maintain your firearm in good working order.** If required, have a qualified gunsmith service your firearm.

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Avoid firing near buildings or roads.**

Respect the rights of others to safe travel and undisturbed use of their property. Only shoot near buildings with authorized permission, and only if it is legal and safe.

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Know and respect firearms regulations and local by-laws.**

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

Social Responsibilities of a Firearm User

- **Wear safety equipment.**
Encourage others to do the same. Safety equipment may include, but should not be limited to, sight and hearing protection, gloves, caps and proper clothing.

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

You may leave a non-restricted firearm unattended in your vehicle if:

- **It is unloaded: *AND***
- **Placed in a locked truck or similar compartment of the vehicle**

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

If the unattended vehicle does not have a truck or similar compartment:

- **Lock the vehicle, or the part of the vehicle that contains the non-restricted firearm; AND**
- **Leave the non-restricted firearm inside, unloaded and out of sight.**

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

A restricted firearm must be transported only if it is:

- **Unloaded; AND**
- **Rendered inoperable by using a secure locking device; AND**

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

A restricted firearm must be transported only if it is:

- It is in a locked container that is made of an opaque material and cannot be easily broken open or into or accidentally opened during transportation; AND
- You may leave the locked container in an attended vehicle's securely locked trunk or similar compartment.
 - If the unattended vehicle is not equipped with a trunk or similar compartment, lock the vehicle, or the part of the vehicle that contains the container and the container is not visible from outside the vehicle.

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

Every person who stores, displays, transports or handles a firearm in a manner contrary to the *Storage, Display, Transportation and Handling of Firearms by Individuals Regulations* may,

- **lose their firearm,**
- **lose their license,**
- **be prohibited from possessing firearms for a period of time, and is:**

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

1. guilty of an indictable offence and liable to imprisonment,

- In the case of a first offence, for a term not exceeding two years, and
- In the case of a second or subsequent offence, for a term not exceeding five years; or

2. guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction (a fine of \$5,000 and/or six months imprisonment).

Reference: Subsections 86(2) and (3) of Part III of the *Criminal Code*

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

Every person commits an offence who, without lawful excuse, points a firearm at another person, whether the firearm is loaded or unloaded, and may,

- **lose their firearm,**
- **lose their license,**
- **be prohibited from possessing a firearm for a period of time and is:**

FIREARM SAFETY REVIEW

- 1. guilty of an indictable offence and liable to imprisonment for a term not exceeding five years; or**
- 2. guilty of an offence punishable on summary conviction (a fine of \$5,000 and/or six months imprisonment).**

Reference: Subsections 87(1) and (2) of Part III of the *Criminal Code*

RANGE RULES

1. All members must execute a “liability waiver release” prior to entry to the range.
2. Members are legally and financially responsible for the actions of their guests.

RANGE RULES

3. Shooting hours:
 - Shooting is allowed sunrise to sunset, 365 days a year, except for required maintenance
 - Shooting after sunset may be allowed during night shooting seminars or events, by the executive with written permission
 - Ranges may be required to be closed if a site downrange within the safety template area is occupied for an extended period of time – i.e. for ‘agricultural, oilfield or maintenance activities’.

RANGE RULES

4. All Federal and Provincial Regulations are to be observed at all times at the Range.
 - **Failure to comply may result in eviction from and being banned from the Range, without refund of fees or dues.**
 5. No Hunting of Wildlife Allowed.
 - **Anyone shooting at objects other than targets authorized by the club will be escorted off the Range.**

RANGE RULES

6. All members in a vehicle must enter using their Key FOB upon arrival at the gate.
 7. Members may host up to 2 guest shooters per day. There is no fee for first and second time guest shooters.
 - All subsequent visits will have a nominal fee of \$15 per person per visit.
 - All non-shooting guests are the responsibility of the host member.

RANGE RULES

8. All shooters must produce their membership card upon request from any other member and must have it on their person.
9. Guests at matches and commercial guest customers have unescorted shooting privileges only on the ranges booked for the match or the commercial event. They are not allowed to shoot on other ranges without the supervision of a member.

RANGE RULES

10. All shooters must wear adequate eye and ear protection while on any of the ranges whether discharging a firearm or not.

RANGE RULES

11. All firearms must be UNLOADED and, in addition, CARRIED IN AN UPRIGHT POSITION (unless encased or on a gun cart) until you arrive at the designated shooting area. Here firearms may be placed either on an upright stand, left on the gun cart, or laid on a shooting bench, unloaded, action open and visible and pointed downrange.

RANGE RULES

11. (i) Holsters for handguns are permitted to be used on the range except for shoulder holsters, which are not permitted on the range.

(ii) Handguns must be unloaded until the shooter is at the firing line.



46

RANGE RULES

12. No person is permitted to handle a firearm when any person is downrange of the firing line.
 - Firearms need to be unloaded, bolt open, breech open and pointed downrange.

RANGE RULES

13. Minor shooters (under 18 years of age) are welcome and encouraged. All minor shooters must be under the direct, immediate and constant supervision of an adult while shooting and must otherwise be supervised and behave in a responsible and safe manner.

RANGE RULES

14. The consumption or possession of alcohol or drugs is not permitted within club boundaries while any portion of the Range remains open to shooting. Anyone found in contravention of this rule, including shooters who have consumed alcohol immediately prior to arriving at the Range, or appear to be impaired from any source, may be permanently banned from the Range.

RANGE RULES

15. No smoking unless in designated areas.
 - No smoking or open flame in effect during fire bans.

RANGE RULES

16. Firearms not in immediate use are to be empty of all ammunition and magazines, and,
- in the case of long guns, stored with their actions open and visible in the racks provided or stored in a suitable similar manner including in gun carts.
 - in the case of handguns, stored with their actions open and visible, in a case or stored in a holster with hammer down.
 - or stored in a locked vehicle, cased or out of sight.

RANGE RULES

17. All ranges require a common cease fire and a common firing line. Shooters must not be positioned forward of other shooters on the firing line.

RANGE RULES

18. When two or more shooters are on a particular range, one must assume the responsibility of range officer, to declare cease fires and the resumption of shooting, following a check of the range.
- **Shooters must get an “All Clear” signal from the range officer before going downrange to post, check or retrieve targets.**

The member acting as range officer is responsible to ensure that everyone on the line is following the “cease fire” and other range commands and is maintaining a common firing line.

- **Any individual may call ‘Cease Fire’ at any time.**

RANGE RULES

19. All shots are to be made at the target directly in front of the shooter's firing position. No shots are to be made at angles across the range, as this poses a ricochet and safety hazard unless the shooter is engaged in an approved competition which permits this activity. Shooters wanting to shoot at a different target stand/distance must move to a firing position which provides the required stand/distance immediately to the front of that position.

RANGE RULES

20. Cartridge restrictions per Federal regulations:

Prohibited Ammunition includes:

- .50 BMG
- Tracer
- Incendiary
- Armour piercing ammunition

RANGE RULES

21. Shotgun/Trap Ranges:

- Only shotguns firing bird-shot are to be used on the shotgun/trap range(s). No slugs or rifles.

- Shotguns may be patterned, using lead shot only, on the designated patterning board.

RANGE RULES

21. Shotgun/Trap Ranges:

- Only clay targets and other approved Sporting Clay targets are to be used on the shotgun range(s)
- Shot shell restrictions: Shot Shell only, maximum shot shells to be size US # 7½ (0.095”), 2¾” in length, 1 1/8 ounce shot maximum.

RANGE RULES

21. Shotgun/Trap Ranges:

- Shotguns firing slugs may be shot on:
 - Action Range 4C (Zombie Range) using slugs only.
No use of regular shot shells.
 - No use of shotguns on:
50M / 100M / 200M / 600M / Action Ranges 4A,B,D,E

RANGE RULES

22. Handguns are to be shot on the

- **100 meter (Range 1)**
- **200 meter (Range 2)**
- **Action range (Range 4)**
- **50 meter (Range 5)**

RANGE RULES

23. Drawing and firing a loaded handgun from a holster must be done in a safe manner and with the greatest care at all times.

- **The handgun must be loaded and unloaded only at the firing line.**

24. Handguns in holsters not in immediate use on a firing line must be unloaded of ammunition &/or magazines

RANGE RULES

25. When moving forwards and backwards to a firing point, pistols must be continuously pointed downrange.

RANGE RULES


26. Firearms shall not be discharged on the archery range.

▪ **ARCHERY ONLY**

- **Broadheads are only allowed at designated Broadhead backstops**

RANGE RULES

27. All trash and spent ammo must be picked up before leaving the range.
 28. All targets shall be removed from backstops upon completion of shooting.
 29. Human silhouette targets are allowed but must be removed from the range when you are finished shooting.

RANGE RULES

30. Dogs and other domestic animals are prohibited on all ranges at all times.
 31. Glass, bottles or other unapproved materials may not be used as targets at anytime.
 32. All range users shall pick up refuse and materials (targets, cartridge brass, shotgun hulls, etc) they use and leave the range clean at all times.

RANGE RULES

- 33. Targets shall be placed on target backboards, not on the support posts or frames
- 34. No vehicles are permitted on the ranges without permission from the Chair or Property Chair.

RANGE RULES

- 35. Special activities or events and range closures shall be authorized only by the executive.
- 36. When there is a special shooting event at a range. That range is closed for all other shooting activities until the event is over.

RANGE RULES

37. The main gate must be locked immediately upon entering and exiting except when there are special shooting events.

RANGE RULES


38. ALL MEMBERS AND GUESTS ARE REQUIRED TO FOLLOW THESE RULES AT ALL TIMES, NO EXCEPTIONS.
- ANYONE DISREGARDING THESE RULES WILL BE REQUIRED TO LEAVE THE RANGE IMMEDIATELY AND MAY BE SUBJECT TO FURTHER ACTIONS OR SANCTIONS AS DETERMINED BY THE TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION EXECUTIVE.

RANGE RULES


39. ANY ACTS OF:

- **ILLEGAL ACTIVITY,**
 - **DANGEROUS**
 - **IRRESPONSIBLE USE OF RANGE FACILITIES**
 - **ACTS OF VANDALISM**
 - **DESTRUCTION OF PROPERTY**
-

RANGE RULES

39. ANY ACT

- **WILL RESULT IN IMMEDIATE AND PERMANENT REVOCATION OF MEMBERSHIP FROM THE TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION PROPERTY.**
 - **THE FOUNDATION WILL ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE IN ANY CRIMINAL CODE INVESTIGATION.**

RANGE RULES - EXCEPTIONS

The following exceptions are allowed for special organized groups within TSF:

- Holding formal competitions
- Practice sessions
- Firearm education courses

While under the direct control of their respective Range Officer(s)/ Instructor(s) for the entire time.

RANGE RULES - EXCEPTIONS

Examples of these groups include:

Sports Clays	Silhouette
Cowboy Action	Swiss Rifle
IPSC	IDPA
NRA	Specialize marksman courses

RANGE RULES - EXCEPTIONS

These exceptions are not allowed for the general membership during casual shooting.

Targets may include steel targets with special permission and special conditions of usage.

RANGE RULES - EXCEPTIONS

- Rifles utilizing pistol cartridges may be shot on the handgun range(s). Example 44/40, 38/40, 45 Colt
- Use of a shotgun on any range may be approved by the executive in special cases. More than one shotgun shell may be loaded into a shotgun at a time. Approved competition and practice may utilize other sizes of lead shot, by the executive with written authorization.

RANGE RULES - EXCEPTIONS

- Approved competition and practice may set target stands at other locations than at the rear berms with special permission and specific conditions of usage, by the executive with written permission.

RANGE COURTESY

There are certain standards of range courtesy. Considerate shooters follow the following standards:

- Rules and procedures may vary occasionally. Check and obey the approved rules. There should be a safety briefing before starting.
- Sign in to the firing range upon arrival.
- Avoid interrupting or distracting others when they are shooting.

RANGE COURTESY

- Do not smoke on the firing line.
- Ask the owner's or shooter's permission before handling that person's firearm or equipment.
- Leave enough space between you and others to ensure safety.
- If firing particularly smoky firearms, shoot from downwind of others on the firing line.
Esp Black Powder



77

RANGE COURTESY

- Do not fire on other people's targets, targets not directly down range from yourself or any target that may disturb others.
- Those firing semi-automatic firearms should take a firing point where other people will not be disturbed by ejecting casings.
- Rapid firing may disturb shooters sighting-in or deliberate target work.

RANGE COURTESY

- Clean up after shooting. Pick up cartridge casings. Take down targets.
- Put away any range-owned equipment you have used. Eg, sandbags, bench rests

SHOOTING COMPLEX – EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

In the event of an emergency:

1. Dial 911
2. Request appropriate emergency services to the MD of Taber Shooting Complex – SE35-10-17/W4
3. Provide first aid attention to any injured persons within your ability to do so.

SHOOTING COMPLEX – EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

In the event of an emergency:

4. Send a guide to open the main entrance gate when emergency services arrive and have them direct EMS to the scene.
5. Complete RSO incident reporting form and submit to an executive member immediately.

RANGE SAFETY OFFICER PROGRAM
EMERGENCY ACTION PLAN

Range Safety Officer

- Appoint acting RSO
- take charge immediately, assess the situation, determine necessity for ambulance or other emergency equipment
- secure the area - keep area clear of bystanders
- don't move the injured person unless vital
- decide how to move the injured person - if moving is necessary
- remain with injured person
- to the extent possible protect the injured person from the elements
- obtain as much medical information as possible
- complete the incident report

Acting RSO

Consult RSO Handbook/Operations manual

- list of emergency phone numbers
- location of range facilities/ directions as required
- first aid kit and other equipment as required to attending RSO
- locate telephone
- provide information to emergency dispatcher
- contact police as required
- ensure ready access by emergency vehicles
- other contacts as required
- complete incident report

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

REMEMBER: 'EVERYONE IS A RANGE SAFETY OFFICER!'
Safety is a primary responsibility of the shooter at all times.

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

1. Only 1 vehicle at a time for entry and exit at the gate. **WAIT** for the gate to go through a complete cycle before using the Key fob again.
2. Stay on the left side of the roadway until you have a clear line of sight. Follow the signs indicating Left Hand Traffic.

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

3. Upon entry to the range, proceed to the Sign In Shed located at the entrance to Parking Lot.
 - a. Everyone must sign in – Shooters and observers
 - b. All guest shooters must pay a \$15/day fee on their 3rd and subsequent visits (insurance cost) use envelope provided in shed (sign and date it)
 - c. The 1st shooter on the range is designated the Range Safety Officer (RSO). This person must wear a RSO Vest found in the locker so as to indicate to any other shooters their role.

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

- d. If the RSO leaves the range and other shooters are still present and active, then the vest must be passed on to another Member to act in the role of RSO.
 - e. The last shooter (RSO) should return the vest to the locker in the Sign In Shed.
 - f. ALL shooters must wear a lanyard with their membership card displayed and ALL guests must wear a lanyard with the guest pass displayed.

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

- g. NO PERSON **WHO IS NOT** A MEMBER THAT HAS COMPLETED THE RANGE SAFETY COURSE AND THEREFORE **IS NOT** ENTITLED TO BE IN POSSESSION OF A GATE FOB, IS PERMITTED TO BE ON THE RANGE UNLESS UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF THE QUALIFIED MEMBER (RSO)

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

3. Once you have completed the requirements at the Sign In Shed, then you are ready to park and proceed to the range of your choice.

The following are requirements at each range:

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

- a. All firearms must be UNLOADED and CARRIED IN AN UPRIGHT POSITION (unless encased or on a gun cart) until you arrive at the designated shooting area. Here firearms may be placed either upright on a upright stand, left on the gun cart or laid on a shooting bench, unloaded, action open & visible and pointing downrange.
- b. All shooters and observers must wear hearing and eye protection at all times.

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

- c. Observe Flag signals on entry to the Range.

A **RED FLAG** indicates the range is Active (HOT)
A **GREEN FLAG** indicates the range is INACTIVE (SAFE)
- d. Before a shooter goes downrange (to change or check targets) they must set out a SANDWICH BOARD found at the entrance to Range that indicates that
A CEASE FIRE IN EFFECT – SHOOTER DOWNRANGE

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

- e. While a cease fire is in effect, firearms **CANNOT** be handled – this includes:
- Casing
 - Uncasing
 - Cleaning
 - Adjusting Scopes

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

- f. Only approved targets may be engaged.




- g. All ranges rules as outlined at the Sign-In Shed must be followed at all times.

TABER SHOOTING FOUNDATION RANGE ENTRY PROTOCOL

- h. REMEMBER: 'EVERYONE IS RANGE OFFICER'** and are authorized to give a 'CEASE FIRE' order if they deem it necessary. This is a legal command and upon hearing this command ALL shooters must immediately cease firing, PROVE their firearm safe and step back behind the Cease Fire Line until the RSO is satisfied the Range is once again Safe and a '**RANGE IS ACTIVE - RESUME SHOOTING**' order is given.

- 5.** In the event you witness any safety violations or injuries by any participant on the Range, you must fill in an INCIDENT REPORT which can be found in the Sign-In Shed. Be sure to list all details. First Aid supplies are available in the Shed and the address of the Range is posted outside the Shed for the RCMP or Ambulance Personnel. Leave all reports in the Shed and your contact information. Contact Police / Ambulance as required.
